Secrets of Successful Internet Searching

- Unless you know a specific site, use a Search Engine like Google (www.google.com) or Ask Jeeves (www.aj.com).
- Try using keywords that narrow down your search. Typing 'RELIGION' will give too many useless results. Be more specific - typing 'RELIGIONS ORIGINS EUROPE' may give more effective search results.
- Never use the Internet when a book or CD ROM will do the job.
- Record the Websites you use in your Bibliography, just like for books.
- Tell your teacher and classmates about any useful sites you come across—the Web is all about the sharing of info!

NO.	TASK	TIPS
1. * (30)	With a limited budget of \$7500, plan an international holiday. You can go by yourself or decide to take someone with you but remember that if you do your money will need to stretch much further (e.g. you may need to stay at backpackers hostels, not 5 star hotels!). You must be overseas for at least 7 days and must account for all flights (including connecting journeys), accommodation, food and sightseeing/events.	Gather quotes from online travel companies, hotels and airlines, or pay a visit to a local Flight Centre for some free brochures.
2. * (30)	Imagine your family is moving overseas to begin a new life. Choose a country and research / present important facts and information that you will need to consider such as: *Economy & currency *Geography *Jobs & industries *Climate *Foods & cuisine *Customs & religions *Culture & entertainment	Create a table of info & facts or maybe present it as a brochure titled "So, You're Moving To"
3. * (20)	Research the origins and history of one country's National Flag. Capture an image of it and write a paragraph explaining the symbols and meaning behind it. Then design your own flag for a country of your choice, explaining in a paragraph the meanings behind the colours and symbolism you have used.	Make your flag using coloured paper, pencils, textas or paint. Or you could use a program like Kid Pix.
4. (20)	Choose a sport that is not commonly played in Australia. Research and demonstrate to the class how the sport is played and if possible organise a game.	Plan with the teacher in advance if you'd like some help running a PE session!
5. (10)	List 5 countries that you would like to visit. Explain why. List 5 countries you would not like to visit. Why not?	You could do a Plus/Minus/Interesting for the places chosen.
6. (10)	Learn the national anthem from another country. With a group of friends, perform the anthem to the class.	See if you can find the actual music from the Library or the Web.
7. (20)	Many cultures have a rich history of storytelling which helps shape future generations. Locate a traditional Aboriginal Dreaming Story and write about how it explains an aspect of Creation or a rule for living. Then, retell the story with a Junior Primary Buddy Class as the audience.	You could make a comic, Power Point or a story book. Remember, it must be suitable for your buddy.
8. (10)	Find out about the European unit of money (currency) called 'The Euro' by completing the Euro Tasksheet.	Ask your teacher for the Euro Tasksheet.

9. (20)	Any traveller who heads overseas must have a passport for security and identification purposes. Create your own personal passport that includes a coat of arms and information that you would find in an authentic passport.	Ask your parents or teacher if they have a passport you can look at.
10. (20)	Different countries use different money systems and currencies. Find an online Currency Converter or use the newspaper to find a current 'exchange rate' (the amount an Australian dollar is worth in another country). Convert AUD \$100 into 5 different currencies. Research and answer these questions: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Why don't all countries share the same currency? Why do exchange rates change daily? 11. (20)	Research and present a table that compares and contrasts some of the world's major religions.	Use the table below as an example.

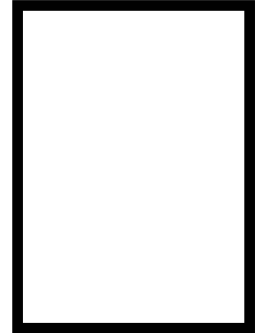
